The Conservation Education Committee is a standing committee of Historic Hoosier Hills and sponsors two teacher workshops each year to help southern Indiana teachers learn more about conservation and natural resources, using the out of doors as a teaching tool. The workshops have been very successful with good attendance and high interest in the hands-on activities the committee provides.

Ripley County Farmers Market Wraps up Successful First Year



Attendance and support for the new Ripley County Farmers Market far exceeded expectations this year, as shown in a report provided by the Ripley County Parks Department. While the market didn't open until mid-summer – the second Saturday of the County Fair was opening day – support by vendors and buyers was excellent. The market was open 12 Saturdays and 12 Wednesdays, and averaged 7 vendors per market day. It also averaged 141 customers on Saturdays and 44 on Wednesdays.

The market was developed after a conference in Madison last February planted the seeds. That conference was sponsored by the Southern Indiana Rural Development Project (SIRDP) and offered a series of breakout session son how to plan, set up and operate a local farmers market.

Darla Westerfeld, Parks Director for the Ripley County Parks Department, and **Katherine Taul**, Executive Director of the Ripley County Tourism Commission, attended the conference and decided to see if a market would work in Ripley County. With help

from **Bud Beesley** of the Jennings County Farmers Market and support form the **Ripley County Farm Bureau** and Historic Hoosier Hills, the Ripley County market was put into operation. The market gives local growers a place to market their produce and other farm products locally, and gives residents access to farm fresh items.

The Market group is holding a dinner meeting on January 9 at Osgood to elect a board of directors from the list of first year vendors, and to review and adopt market rules for 2003. The Ripley County Farmers Market is a great asset for both produces and consumers, and looks forward to an even better year in 2003.
